Offerings collected during the Annual Gathering will be going to the following ministries:

Blue Theology Mission Station is a place where current science in marine biology meets a theology of creation justice. We host groups to engage in experiential learning, service projects, and contemplative practice with God's marine creation. At Blue Theology, we pray for the health of our oceans while exploring tidepools. We believe that ocean conservation is a spiritual practice. We become Blue Theologians, or faithful advocates for a healthy ocean, through our experiences. These experiences may include scientific data collection, kayaking alongside otters, participating in sand dune restoration, or collecting trash on the beach. As hymnist, Dan Damon writes, "the ocean is a call to worship." This program is our profound investment into the future health of the ocean as well as our human-ecological relationships. **Serra Center** Since 1975, Serra Center has been committed to providing compassionate care for individuals with developmental disabilities. We serve over 80 men and women in our community-based Residential Care Homes, Independent, and Supported Living Services. The individuals served live in more than 65 traditional and accessible homes and apartments in residential neighborhoods throughout Alameda County.

Reconciliation Ministry Reconciliation Ministry of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) was born out of the civil unrest that ensued following the martyrdom of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. on April 4, 1968. His murder brought to the fore, in the life of our church, the dis-ease of our living in two separate societies – one which benefits one group of people and one which systemically marginalizes the poor and powerless. Beginning with Resolution 29 of the International Convention of the Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ) in 1968, our Church has persistently pursued ways to address the sin of racism through resolutions and direct action in our congregations, Regions, General Ministries, and Recognized Ministry partnerships. The Pro-Reconciliation /Anti-Racism initiative has made steady progress. In 2007, Regions were urged to assume primary leadership in enabling congregational involvement in the work of racial reconciliation.

In our endeavors to work for racial and social justice and ensure welcome for all, we promote relationship-building. #### Disciple Men

#### MISSION STATEMENT

#### Housing and Shelter Ministry

Gathers and disseminates information about the availability of affordable housing in each area.

Partners with Christian Church Homes.

The Christian Church of Northern California-Nevada recognizes that God calls us to embrace the diversity of the world around us! Likewise, we recognize that in the course of our church's history, we have fallen short of that call, and that the sin of racism and other forms of oppression keep us from being in full relationship with our God. For that reason, we diligently work towards becoming an anti-racist, anti-oppressive, pro-reconciling church!

#### Search and Call

The Disciples have a web-based Search and Call system that helps congregations with specific ministerial needs find clergy with compatible gifts and graces for ministry to meet those needs. Our Search and Call process benefits clergy and congregation alike by ensuring that candidates who are seeking ministry positions have the appropriate credentials to be in good standing with the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). Ministers fill out a standardized profile that helps congregations and clergy alike. In addition to helping congregations compare "apples to apples" rather than sorting through a variety of resumes, the system also helps ensure that ministers are evaluated only by their skills and abilities rather than the format of their resume.

#### Training & Care

The Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) of Northern California-Nevada (CCNC-N) extends a warm welcome as you begin your graduate work in the Northern California area and coming under the auspices of the Training and Care Committee (T&C).

The CCNC-N "Commission on Ministry" discerns issues regarding ministerial ordination and standing. These functions are divided into two committees, Training and Care (T&C) and Recognition and Standing (R&S). T&C journeys with candidates toward ordination along either the Seminary Track (ST) or Apprentice Track (AT). Recognition and Standing (R&S) reviews transference of ordination to Disciples and issues of "standing," (issues concerning maintenance of active ordination and commissioning).

We meet regularly with students attending seminary, most often matriculating through one of the Graduate Theological Union schools of Berkeley. The Pacific School of Religion (PSR) and San Francisco Theological Seminary (SFTS) are the seminaries of the eight in the GTU where most of the students matriculate.

A student who is enrolled in a Masters of Divinity (M.Div.) degree must enter Training and Care to be ordained. Requirements of the committee include, but are not limited to, a spiritual autobiography, one unit of Clinical Pastoral Education, a psychological evaluation, a sponsorship by at least one Disciples of Christ congregation, an ordination paper, a verified assimilation of "Competencies" and a recommendation for ordination from the committee.

#### Regional Youth Council

The mission of the CCNC-N Regional Youth Council (RYC) is to foster personal and spiritual growth in both RYC members and the youth of the region. The RYC seeks to encourage developing leadership skills and to promote integrity through ethical decision making. The RYC will serve as role models and leaders to the Chi Rho (6-8 grade) and CYF (9-12 grade) youth of the region by creating and implementing programming for these age groups.

All RYC members will be held accountable to the RYC policies and covenant by each other, the CCNC-N Regional Minister and the Director of Youth Ministries. All RYC members, youth and adults are representatives of the CCNC-N region and are also asked to abide by all CCNC-N policies. (i.e. adult background checks, boundary trainings, staff training, event covenants)

#### Women's Ministries

Disciples Women in the CCNC-N Region are an active group of women who serve Jesus Christ through mission, worship and study. Our current and future opportunities are outlined here. You can also check out what Disciples Women are doing across the world.

## Ministry Reports

#### General Board Report

Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) of Northern California-Nevada

In 2022, the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ in Northern California-Nevada celebrates that we continued to offer ministries of presence, planning, and participation including hosting our first in person/hybrid Annual Gathering since 2019.

In addition to the ministries described below, we continue to visit congregations, lead retreats and gather with congregations for worship and other opportunities for developing the leadership and relationships vital for a strong regional ministry.

We are blessed that we are able to have in person gatherings; it is wonderful seeing people face to face.

#### Women's Ministries Education and Housing – Monica Cross, staff

Women's Spring Renewal and Fall Retreat - The theme for the 2022 Women's Spring Renewal was I've Got a Testimony. The keynote speaker was Rev. Dr. Katrina Marsh. Discussion: What is the power of testimony? Sharing your testimony helps you heal and bring us closer together. Compassionate witnessing of our personal series helps us recover and help others do the same. This type of faith cultivates courage, resilience, and a conviction to share what God has done in your life with others. The offering went to the Angel Fund and the Regional Housing Program. The theme for the 2022 Women's Fall Retreat was Reignite Your Light: Dare to Dream. The keynote speaker was General Minister and President Terri Horde Owens. Her keynote focused on the importance of the covenant in the life of the Church. Her discussion on the covenant was salient as the women attended workshops on Fundraising, General Ministry, Mission, and Social Justice.

2022 saw the launch of two new regional ministries. These ministries are the Housing and Shelter Ministry and the Regional Education Ministry. The Housing and Shelter Ministry provides resources to Disciples who are at risk of losing their housing or unable to pay utilities. Since its launch the Housing and Shelter Ministry has provided resources for a person in need of resources for housing. The Regional Education Ministry provides support that helps congregations in their call to enable persons to be biblically informed, to grow in their faith, to live responsibly in the world as faithful disciples of Christ, and to equip people to be effective leaders.

#### New Church Ministries Training and Care Men's Ministries Kyung-Min Daniel Lee, staff

Associate Regional Minster's Report January 25, 2023, As the challenges of COVID fade gradually, I see a revival of in-person interaction in my ministries. Seeing many cars on freeways and their traffics relieves me somehow when I see them positively, for it tells us we are returning to normal interaction. I believe physical interaction supersede any other means of relationship building. With that change in the interaction context, there had been physical activities of four ministries. And the level of interaction has gone up for positive signs. First, Training and Care for seminarians in their ordination process went back to the in-person meeting last September.

The outcome of each meeting produced some real feelings and concerns, and people in the space felt connected to receive and give personal care and love. Men's Ministry also returned to the inperson gathering for the retreat in July. Not only were they excited to be there in person to greet, but the anticipation of spending time together brought some degree of energy into the space, which intensified the interaction and relationship. Although the gathering was less than thirty, I believe the group felt vibes of closeness. The planned New Church gathering in December didn't go through due to the sickness of a couple of key players. However, the planning part via Zoom yielded positive energy for high anticipation and expectation. For the Regional NAPAD ministry, there was little interaction last year due to a lack of group leadership, hoping to bring it back in the year 2023. The year 2022 brought some of the energy of interaction back to the ministries. I will continue investing in that energy this year to support and connect with each other and build relationships as one body for the region's life.

#### Youth Ministry Haley Monachello, staff

Youth Ministry continues with plans for a summer camp in June and July. We will also host an adult camp and a camp for children and their adult family members. The Northern California-Nevada, Arizona, and Pacific Southwest Regions also joined together in the "Rekindle" Youth Conference – 1 Event 3 Locations 3 Regions. The event took place February 18.

While we have much to celebrate, we are challenged by congregations struggling to regain ground lost during the worst of the COVID pandemic. They have been slow to recover and some of them will not survive under their current circumstances.

As we think about what we hope to accomplish in the coming year, we pray to grow our education ministries, support congregations as they make difficult decisions, and continue to celebrate that we are in this church together and that we are united in this region with each other and with other regions and the whole people of God.

The General Board should know that there is excitement about ministry and church in our region.

Continue to pray that we will find all that we need to meet this moment in ministry. It is changing, and yet the call to faithfulness remains strong and vital.

Also, the past year has been all sorts, from leadership transitions to fellowship to discipline and the development of communication. This year, I hope to focus on continuing the communication development and the Disciple identity.

The following describes some of the four ministries under my purview.

#### New Church Movement (NCM)

The ministry of the New Church Movement seeks to carry the Pentecost experience by receiving and welcoming communities of Christians hoping to grow their communities into a church. New Church Ministry will nurture, assist, guide, and support their endeavor towards this goal. It is the hope that they will form a church that will express their unique charisma and belief that first brought them together. This is a new proposed Vision Statement drafted by Rev. Ken Babauta. Ken is pastoring at Barrett Ave Christian Church in Richmond and has served the New Church Committee for some time as treasurer. He transitioned from his predecessors a couple of months ago, from Rev. Dr. Leon Bacchause to Ms. Marianne Knot.

Can you guess how many churches are in formation or new churches in the CCNC-N region? We used to have twelve (12) but now ten (10). The Table in Berkeley and Heartbeat Organic in Citrus Height didn't make it in the past two years and disbanded. The chair's report shows the list of the new churches. Please take a look. With Ken's leadership, the Vision and Proclamation statements will be updated, and the ministry's outlook will be different from the past. With the collaboration with the Regional NAPAD, the new churches with a dual standing will reemphasize and revamp their relationship with the Disciples and its identity. As such, Recognition and Standing Committee is considering implementing and requiring a Disciples History and Polity class every two or three years for standing.

Like Men's Ministry, NCM has an Exhibit Table at this Gathering. The Table should show all the ten new churches showing in the Ken's report. These new churches also represent the Full Church Committee, who meets quarterly. Much of the ministry's work is done by the Executive Committee (EC), e.g., planning events and programs, scheduling meetings, creating agendas, etc. The display of the Exhibit Table was another work of the EC, and I want to thank Minister Carolyn Anderson, one of the EC members. The rest of the EC members are Rev. Tala Faaleava (Secretary) and Sandy Samalei.

At this time, NCM is in conversation with two (2) planters, and I hope to report and introduce them to the region at the next Gathering.

#### Men's Ministry (formally Disciples Men)

The Regional Men's Ministry is mindful of the purpose of the General Conference of Disciples Men, "ministering to the unique needs of men in the church, enabling them to fulfill their potential as servants of God, and strengthening the total ministry of the church."

As you may know, Carl Cordes leads the committee with zeal and commitment. His Annual Gathering report is concise and tells what they do. Please take a look. The information begins with the Executive Committee members and the programs' dates, including the upcoming retreats in July and October. It seems like these retreats will likely be ongoing events in the future. For such preparation, the committee met twice or thrice a month for the past months and sought ideas and inspiration. Carl has been busy seeking keynoters and venues and getting the program's content and outlines. He is doing a heck of a great job. Carl and I will continue discussing visiting our local churches to promote men's participation. I hope to see it workable in the future.

#### Regional North American Pacific Asian Disciples (NAPAD)

The Regional NAPAD is a community for fellowship and participation in the total mission of the Church, trying to recognize and promote the gifts and presence of Pacific Islanders and Asian disciples in the life and work of the Church.

Like the last year, this community was dormant and had little interaction and participation except for the 2023 Lunar New Year Luncheon Celebration held on the day before, Saturday, January 21, with a few of the selected regional NAPA-disciples. The picture of that luncheon was posted on the Regional NAPAD Facebook, https://www.facebook.com/groups/1410608392577637.

Most notable was the presence of JoAnne Kagiwada, a spouse of the late David Kwgiwada, one of the founders of NAPAD. Her company personally encouraged and supported me and the ministry of NAPAD with her wisdom, boldness, and insights. This year the Regional NAPAD, along with the ministry of the New Church Movement, explores the Disciple identity for those with a dual standing. Most of the NAPA-disciples are non-Disciples backgrounds experienced as the 2nd, 3rd, or 4th Disciple generations. This community will explore the Disciple's identity through a workshop and/or one-day training, hoping to benefit and help the region and the community with who and what we are as the Disciples.

The word Dual Standing should address, explore, and implement its covenantal relationship. The year ahead will be challenging but also should be exciting as well.

The Regional NAPAD used to have ten (10) churches but with a closure of the Samoan congregation in Antioch, now down to nine (9): one (1) Chinese congregation, three (3) Korean, and five (5) Samoans. The list of the churches and their website is as

Please note that May is Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month. The month of May was chosen to commemorate the immigration of the first Japanese to the United States on May 7, 1843, and to mark the anniversary of the completion of the transcontinental railroad on May 10, 1869. The majority of the workers who laid the tracks were Chinese immigrants.[i] I hope you can join their celebration by visiting https://asianpacificheritage.gov/about/ and learning some of their heritage

#### Training and Care

This ministry is joyous and challenging when walking along with the committee for candidates' responding to ordination calling: joyful to work with the committee for their insights and wisdom and challenged when training or discipline is part of the journey and when care is needed.

As my last Annual Gathering (AG) report mentioned, Rev. Fred Williams and Rev. Paul Gaffney became co-chairs after Rev. Susan Parsley's retirement. Due to his health issue early this year, Fred resigned from the committee; since then, Paul has led the committee with nine other members. Paul's AG covers what the committee does and the list of the committee members and candidates currently in the process, approval of ordination, and prospectives.

I look forward to this summer as the committee is preparing to revisit the Training and Care Manual for another revision.

I close this report with my gratitude for all your support.

## Ministry Council Report -

Purpose - To oversee the ministry mission of the Region by fostering, supporting, and working with mission clusters, standing committees, and individual congregations to carry out the mission of the church. This committee also consists of members of the Region's standing committees as well as representatives from the mission clusters. Officers are -

Since the last Annual Gathering on April 30, 2022, the Ministry Council has met four times on Zoom (meetings are on the fifth Tuesday of months that have five Tuesdays.) We have several people whose terms end this year, but meeting attendance and participation has remained steady. Our challenge has been replacing committee members, particularly clergy, who have retired or moved on to other outside the Region.

Our main projects for the year has been establishing the CCNCN Housing and Shelter Ministry and the CCNCN Education Committee.

#### **CCNCN** Housing and Shelter Committee

The purpose of this project is to help members of CCNCN congregations maintain safe and secure housing and to advocate for more affordable housing across the region. J. Norman Bardsley brought this idea to the Ministry Committee's attention almost two years ago. The ministry in funded by seed money that has been set aside as well as direct donations to the project. Our goal is to assist five individuals per year who are experiencing homelessness. This past year, we provided financial support for one person who was in need of temporary shelter. We have reviewed two other cases. Our challenge has been coming up with an application process that is consistent and fair. The funds are available, but it is a struggle to find people who are qualified to do the necessary case management. The committee is on the lookout for ministry partners and programs that might help in this ministry. Christian Church Homes has been helpful in guiding us. The committee is reviewing Senate Bill 4 authored by Senator Scott Wiener - Affordable Housing on Faith Lands Act. This bill would allow faith institutions (such as churches, synagogues, and mosques) along with nonprofit colleges to build affordable housing on their property by-right, even if local zoning prevents this housing.

The committee is working with the Regional Minister to set the Region's future ministry goals and objectives. The Regional Minister has been conducting Mission Cluster Meetings where she asks eight questions for participants to answer concerning their ministry needs. Once the data has been gathered and discussed, we can continue the work of setting ministry goals and developing responses to the region's ministry needs.

#### **CCNCN Education Committee**

The education committee has been discussing educational opportunities for our region's congregations. Currently, we are working on a program that draws from our movement's rich history to ask, "Are we who we say we are?" The workshop, "Bound to God and One Another" came out of this committee's work, and if it goes well, we will continue to develop this idea into a program that can be presented at congregations or mission cluster meetings.

The Personnel Committee has reviewed the recommendations for the Regional Minister based on her last performance review. The committee determined that Rev. Dr. LaTaunya Bynum has addressed and meet these recommendations.

#### Mission Trip

On Sunday, April 2nd, six members of CCNC-N churches gathered at the Community of the Great Commission for the 16th annual Holy Week Mission Trip. Beginning just six months after Hurricane Katrina devastated New Orleans and other areas of the Gulf Coast, members of our churches have traveled to a variety of locations to assist with recovery efforts following various natural disasters—four years in the New Orleans area, and then in Mississippi, Texas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Colorado, Iowa, Tennessee, Puerto Rico, and also trips within California—Lake County (twice), Paradise, and this year the Community of the Great Commission.

A total of nine people traveled to CGC to work at least one day to prepare our camp for the upcoming season after the camp was nearly lost to the Mosquito Fire last summer. Those attending and working were Tina Borgman, Sharon Armus, Becky Gordon, Pat Hughes, Tristan Tang, Larry Love, Virginia Farley, Judy Bever, and Kevin Lue.

Working with CGC camp manager, Bobby Thoennes, the group first searched the camp for a water leak that left the camp, including our mission trip crew, without running water. While one leak was found, there was still a leak somewhere, but the crew was able to make it through three days of work (through Wednesday) by melting snow and using snow run-off from the roof of Claar House for our water needs.

One of our cars also got stuck in the snow and required several hours of snow shoveling and ingenuity over four days to get it free.

In spite of the challenges (we also got snowed on), the mission trip team was able to:

- Do deep cleaning of Claar House and Bobbitt Hall
- Clean the tile and grouting in the Bobbitt area shower house
- Brushed layers of pine needles off the roof of the Bobbitt shower house
- Cleared away damaged water heating panels around the swimming pool
- Cleared and piled up fallen branches and other natural debris around the pool area and Bobbitt Hall
- Cleared snow and debris off the Bobbitt deck and the walk-ways and porches of all of the cabins in the Bobbitt area
- Sanded and painted two doors at the pool house

Members of the group returned to their homes after the workday on Wednesday.

Special thanks to Lou Ann Hughes who helped organize the trip...even though she was unable to attend due to illness, and to Sharon Armus and Becky Gordon who planned the meals and purchased the food for the whole group.




## Pastor Ama Zenya
